(not including points)

MATERIALS:

- [1] AMASH State Parks Panel
- 1/2 yard Wildlife Navy
- 1/4 yard Icons DK Teal
- 1/4 yard Icons Navy
- 1/4 yard Blender Denim
- 1/4 yard Blender Wood Taupe
- 1/4 yard Blender Brown
- 1/4 yard Blender Tan
- 1 yard Backing

BEFORE SEWING, READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS. ALL SEAMS ARE 1/4" UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED. LABELS THE CUTS AS YOU GO. WOF = WIDTH OF FABRIC; LOF = LENGTH OF FABRIC; RST = RIGHT SIDES TOGETHER

CUTTING:

From AMASH State Parks Panel:

Cut [7] — 7" × 7-1/2" rectangles of the parks of your choice

From Blender Denim Fabric:

- Cut [3] — 1" × WOF strips
- Subcut [8] — 1" × 7" rectangles
- Subcut [8] — 1" × 8-1/2" rectangles

From Blender Wood Taupe Fabric:

- Cut [6] — 1-1/2" × WOF strips
- Subcut [8] — 1-1/2" × 8" rectangles
- Subcut [8] — 1-1/2" × 10-1/2" rectangles

From Wildlife Navy Fabric:

- Cut [5] — 2-1/2" × WOF strips
- Subcut [5] — 2-1/2" × 10-1/2" sashing rectangles (remainder for borders)

From each Blender Tan, Blender Brown, Icons Navy and Icons Dk Teal Fabric:

- Cut [2] — 5" × WOF strips
- Subcut [10] — 5" squares of each (can also use scraps of the other blender fabrics to cut additional 5" squares)

BLOCK ASSEMBLY:

- To the top and bottom of State Park square, stitch a Blender Denim 1" × 7" rectangle. (TIP: I stitched with wrong side of the park square facing up, using the white border as the stitching guide.) Press and trim.
- To each side of the block, sew a Blender Denim 1" × 8-1/2" rectangle. Press and trim.
- To the top and bottom of each block stitch a Blender Wood Taupe 1-1/2" × 8" rectangle. Press and trim.
- To each side of the block, sew a Blender Wood Taupe 1-1/2" × 10-1/2" rectangle. Press and trim. This should measure 10" × 10-1/2". Repeat for all [4] Parks panel units.



RUNNER ASSEMBLY:

Sashing and Borders

- To the left side of a Parks block, sew [1] Wildlife Navy 2-1/2" × 10-1/2" sashing. Press and trim. Repeat for the [4] units.
- Sew the [4] units together with sashing between each.
- Sew a Wildlife Navy 2-1/2" × 10-1/2" sashing to the right end of the unit from Step 2.

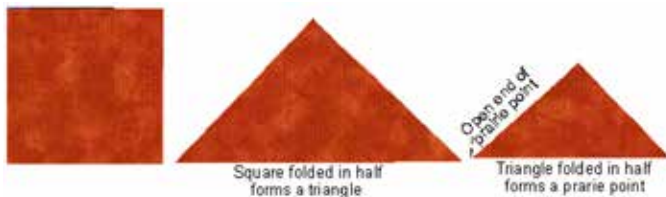


- Take [1] of the 2-1/2" × WOF strips and cut it in half. Sew each half strip to [1] of the long strips, yielding [2] strips approximately 60" long.
- Sew the long border strips to top and bottom of the table runner. Press and trim.



Prairie Points

1. Placing wrong sides together, fold [1] square diagonally from corner to corner to form a triangle. Fold the square again along its longest edge, taking care to align the edges together. Pressing with steam helps to keep the folds intact. Repeat with remaining squares.



2. With RST, evenly space the prairie points along the edges of the table runner, pinning as you go. Use a ruler to line up all the sides. When you're satisfied with the placement of all the triangles, stitch 1/4" around the table runner, starting at the top and sewing towards the tucked in point.



NOTE: This type of prairie point produces a finished triangle with an open edge on one side, enabling you to tuck one point inside the other as they are placed along the edges of the table runner.

Make certain the open ends of the triangles are all going the same way. Use a ruler to space the triangles evenly. (You may have some prairie points leftover depending on how far apart they're spaced.)

RUNNER ASSEMBLY:

1. At one of the short ends, measure approximately 4" from each edge and mark. This is the opening needed to flip the table runner right side out.
2. Place the batting on the table. Place the backing fabric, right side facing up, on top of the batting.
3. Next with RST, place the top section on the backing fabric with the prairie points inside and the raw edges facing out. The batting will be on the bottom at this point.

4. Begin stitching at the second 4" mark. Be sure to back stitch, as this will make the seam more secure when it comes time to flip the table runner right side out. Continue to stitch around the entire table runner until you reach the other 4" mark.

NOTE: You will be stitching over the same stitches that were used to secure the prairie points.

5. Press to set seams. Trim corners, if necessary, to remove bulk. Turn table runner right side out. Press the prairie points outward.
6. Fold the opening fabric in 1/4" and press. Whip stitch opening closed.

FINISHING:

1. Stitch in the ditch around each block to secure the batting. Or, use your favorite quilting design or technique to finish.
